



- Thanks to unprecedented efforts, the number of natural areas in Quebec increased by nearly 200 per year, between 2002 and 2009.
- In 2009, Quebec had around 2 500 protected areas. Over 8% of the province's territory, a size equivalent to that of a country such as Greece, was protected to the highest standards of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN).
- Quebec's protected areas network, which is representative of the diversity of its territory, is an outstanding contribution by the province to the protection of nature and biodiversity.

Better protection of the boreal forest

By far the largest of Quebec's vegetation zones, the boreal forest has seen the greatest increase in regards to the creation of protected areas since 2002. In 2009, Quebec protected nearly 100 000 km² of boreal ecosystems, and efforts to protect ecosystems in this zone continue.






It is estimated that two thirds of all endangered or vulnerable species in Quebec would be included in the vast network of protected areas.


Communities at work



In an effort to protect nature, Quebecers who know their environment and their territory well have proposed no less than 766 sites, since 2002, where new protected areas may be created.









- The creation and management of protected areas is also conducted in collaboration with local and indigenous communities, in respect of their rights, values and use of the territory. The national parks in the Nordic environment are managed by indigenous communities.
- A number of territories with cultural and traditional importance to Aboriginal people are now protected: Kuururjuaq, Fjord-Tursukattaq, Uapishka, Rivière-George, Lac-de-la-Hutte-Sauvage, Lac-Burton-Rivière-Roggan-et-la-Pointe-Louis-XIV, Sikitakan Sipi, Paakumshumwaau-Maatuskaau and Akunuman.

Objective: establishment of protected areas covering 12% of Quebec's territory by 2015, which amounts to 200 000 km²

- protect 65 000 km² of new territories, equivalent to an area 243 times that of the island of Montreal
- increase the size of protected marine areas
